The Red Bandana

• Part 1 – The Essay

The novel The Red Bandana tells the "inspirational story of Welles Crowther, whose decision, determination and sacrifice in the terror of 9/11 have inspired millions, and whose short life offers a lasting lesson on character, calling, and courage--in how we live, and in the legacy we choose to leave behind." For this assignment, you will consider the theme of self-sacrifice as it related to the story as well as the Bible and write a short essay.

Consider the following questions:

- What is selflessness? Have you benefited from the sacrifice of others: in your family, with your friends, and/or by strangers?
- In what ways have you sacrificed for others? How did that impact them? How did that impact you?

- How do the following Bible verses relate to the life of Welles Crowther:
 - Matthew 16:25 "For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it."
 - John 15:13 "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends."

You may also focus a part of the book that you felt most clearly represented the theme of the novel, or you may describe how the bandana became a symbol, and discuss a symbol that impacted your life. Write a 350-word paper that addresses some or all of the questions listed above. (Keep the word count between 300-400 words.)

Part 2 – The Interview
 Throughout the book we see how September 11th, though many years ago, continues to affect people in many different ways. Interview three different people that were alive during 9/11 (I encourage you to find someone who was at least 10 years old during the events, so that you can learn more perspective about it). Complete the Interview document attached to this file and bring into class.
